St Nicolas Church achieves ECO Church Gold Award

St Nicolas Church ECO team recycled thousands of used blister pill packs, braved sixfoot-high nettles to create a bug friendly garden, and got their whole congregation taking shorter showers - all to win a prestigious ECO Church Gold Award.

Led by a seven-strong ECO Team, St Nicolas Church becomes the 54th church in the country and 2nd in the Guildford diocese to have received the award, in recognition of their dedication and determination to walk in step with nature and take action on climate change.

The award was given by the Christian conservation charity A Rocha UK and reflects the commitment of St Nicolas Church to place

creation care at the heart of everything they do.

"The ECO Team aims to get our congregation to consider the environmental impact of everyday life," explained Margaret Hibbert, who has led St Nicolas' ECO Team for 20 years. "We swapped plastic cups for china crockery and use Fairtrade products when we serve refreshments and for our Communion wine.

"We cleared overgrown areas of the garden to create insect friendly areas to increase biodiversity, a wildlife corner for children and designed a tree and wildlife trail for visitors to follow. We installed new efficient radiators to replace an old Victorian system and we have a wide-ranging "unusual" recycling programme from blister packs and binoculars to

postcards."

"St Nicolas is a heritage building on consecrated ground listed in the Domesday Book," said Rector, Rev Alan Jenkins. "There are many challenges but the ECO Team have worked round them. They also encourage us to be greener in our own homes, including taking shorter showers!"

The ECO Team will not be resting on its laurels, says Margaret Hibbert, "we look forward to continuing our environmental improvement journey with our exceptional team and the enthusiasm of our church family and wider community."

Helen Stephens, Church Relations Manager at A-Rocha, explained: "Our huge congratulations to St Nicolas Church on their well-deserved Eco Church Gold Award. It has been a delight to read how they have been managing their churchyard and other garden spaces for the good of nature. There is still so much for us all to do, as they recognise, but in the meantime we hope St Nicolas Church enjoy celebrating this award and seeing others inspired to join them in taking action to care for this amazing world."



When Ofsted inspectors visited the Infant school last term, they found that the "school is highly aspirational for all pupils. This is evident in the strong relationship and extremely inclusive practice." This is high praise, but I don't think you should take Ofsted's word for it. Celebrating Success at The Howard

We celebrated our success over the summer with our KS4 and KS5 results, with students achieving what they needed to go on and be successful in the next stage of their careers: whether this be Howard 6th Form, a 6th Form College, an apprenticeship, a university course, or a first job. Outcomes were improved on 2019 (the only relevant comparison given the variability of the Covid years) at both KS4 and KS5, and remained well above Surrey and National averages. At KS5, we achieved 33% A*/A (%) 60% A*/B and 80% A*/C. These excellent results are testament to the partnership between students, staff, and parents/carers which is so strong at The Howard, and which we know will continue this academic year.

Great Bookham School

The start of the autumn term has been a happy and positive one here at Great Bookham School. It has been a privilege to welcome and settle so many new children into our Pre-school, Reception and Year 3 cohorts, and it is a testament to the staff and children that this transition has been a nurturing and seamless one.

At the end of last academic year, we were delighted to share with our school community that our end of year results for our children were the highest that we had achieved in many years. 88% of our Year 6 cohort met the expected outcome in reading, writing and maths combined with 23% reaching the greater depth standard. When compared to national averages, our children have achieved significantly well.

Our maths results were particularly impressive with 95% of children meeting the expected standard and 60% meeting the greater depth standard. These results are just one measure of our children, and we also revelled in some fantastic celebrations of art, music, science,



sport and other areas of the curriculum. Our wonderful staff team are dedicated to the continual pursuit of excellence in all aspects of learning and school life.

As part of our offer to support all children in building their cultural capital and being able to experience memorable moments and events, our fantastic PTA have worked with school to organise a whole school trip to Leatherhead Theatre to watch this year's pantomime, Dick Whittington – what lucky and well deserving children!

Christmas is fast approaching and we have



many exciting and traditional events planned for all children and families. Our Christmas Fair is scheduled soon and we welcome any members of our local community to attend so please do come and share our festive celebrations.

POWERS OF

ATTORNEY



By preparing a power of attorney you can nominate the people you wish to make decisions for you if you are no longer able to do so yourself or no longer wish to.

There are two types of powers of attorney, one is for making decisions on property and financial affairs such as bank accounts, settling bills, benefits, pensions and buying and selling property. The second covers health and welfare matters including medical care, where to live and social activities.

It's a difficult conversation to have, but don't put it off

Organising a Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA) for yourself, a partner or parent doesn't mean that person has lost the ability to manage their affairs. A modern LPA is a valuable insurance policy, in case they do.

What's the alternative?

With no power of attorney in place, once mental capacity has been lost, your family has no option but to apply to the Court of Protection to become a Deputy. This is normally an expensive and time-consuming process, often taking six months or more during which time assets may be effectively frozen. In certain cases, a local authority may also apply to be a Deputy as it will allow them to access funds available for care.

Bookham Youth & Community Centre - Update



The Bookham Youth and Community Association (BYCA) and Bookhams' Residents Association (BRA) have been working to get the new Youth Centre built (old one closed 2019). MVDC

granted Outline Planning to SCC (2021) to build the new Centre on a corner of Lower Rd Recreation Ground. Various delays meant that costs increased, design had to change and the planning approval expired.

We now have some news:-

- The design stage of a new single storey centre, on the same site, has been completed by SCC with input from BYCA, BRA and Bookham Youth Project (BYP - a branch of the Leatherhead Youth Project).
- MVDC (owns the land), has worked with

SCC, (funding & building the Centre) and agreed terms of a lease, including a peppercorn rent.

 SCC, say they hope to seek planning permission in the new year. We are hoping that the new centre, with a youth and community focus, will be completed by end of 2026.

Youth work

Youth work, activities and strategies will be managed by BYP.

- Closure of the old centre and effects of the pandemic has led to an increase in young people's support needs.
- Jude Crome, Chief Executive of LYP, has told us:-

The new centre will allow us to increase our provision and enable us to work with more young people. Work will be led by Lucy Hicks,

our newly appointed BYP Youth Worker (pictured).

Centre management - community volunteers needed

BYCA will manage the building and finances, on a sub-lease from SCC, on a "not for profit" basis, as it did the old centre. David Cox, Chair of Trustees, said:

We need volunteers to join our team to help us prepare for the takeover and ongoing management of the Centre. Our job is to facilitate the benefits it will bring our young people and community.

In a world that often prioritises standardised testing and rigid curricula, the school stands out by valuing the wonders of curiosity. By creating an environment where questions are welcomed and exploration is encouraged, the school is shaping not just knowledgeable students, but lifelong learners who are excited about the world around them

FaB Repair Cafe

450 Successful Repairs!

Since the opening of the FaB Repair Café in January our talented team of volunteers has successfully repaired over 450 items which could otherwise have ended up in landfill. The Café, serving Fetcham, Bookham and the surrounding areas, I was started by members of Bookham and Horsley Rotary Club along with St. Mary's Church and a team of local volunteers with the goal of living more sustainably and helping the environment by repairing items and reducing landfill.



We meet in the church hall at St. Mary's, Fetcham (off The Ridgeway), on the first Saturday of every month to enable anyone to bring broken possessions to be fixed by our volunteer repairers. You stay with the repairer while the work is being done so that you can see the work being carried out and maybe learn to help yourself next time.

We have volunteers who can repair a wide range of items including:

- Bikes
- Computers/IT
- Clothing & Textiles
- Electrical
- Mechanical
- Jewellery
- Wooden items
- Upholstery
- Garden Tool Sharpening

We also offer a houseplant clinic and seed swap facility at the FaB Repair Café. Bring

along your peaky looking houseplants and let our volunteers assess and offer advice on how best to rescue them. Whether it be yellowing leaves, root rot or bug infestation, they'll be able to help you! You can also bring any excess seeds you may have hanging around at home which are still within the date, and swap them for something new to grow in your garden.

So, if you have anything at home that is not working as it should, why not bring it along and we will see if we can fix it for you (only one item per visit please). Alternatively, just drop in for a coffee to see what we are up to!

Birds that go 'seep' in the night

Redwings are small thrushes that migrate to the UK from colder climes, including Iceland, Scandinavia and Russia. These birds fly in under cover of darkness and if you head outside on a still night, you may hear them overhead, calling to each other with a soft 'seep seep'. They arrive in their thousands and can be heard all over the UK, typically from late September through October.

They make the journey to our shores to feed on berries and during the day you might spot them alongside other birds, such as Starlings and Fieldfares, in trees and hedges. Look for small thrush-like birds with a rusty red patch under their wings and a white stripe above their eyes.

The Society returned from our summer break in September to an excellent and informative talk by Chris Stater entitled 'Here's one they prepared earlier: the first efforts of

Britian's Greatest Architects'.

They included Inigo Jones pavilion at The Queen's House in Greenwich now being restored as an arts centre. The chapel at Pembroke College, Cambridge, Christopher Wren's first attempt as an architect. Joseph Caxton's greenhouses, and the Case at Chatworth that led to the Crystal Palace.

In October our thoughts turned to music with an excellent illustrated talk on Gustav Holst 'The Planets and Beyond' by Roger Askew. As Director of Music at a school, Holst believed that music belonged to all, and he gave special support to all amateur musicians.

In November Christopher Bradley gives an account of the history of coffee from the 1650s, the growth of coffee houses where

ideas were debated and thoughts discussed. The Christmas Lunch Lecture in December is by Caroline Walker and combines illustrations of Max Gill with the words from Eleanor Farjeon's 1916 book of nursery rhymes about our capital city, 'Nursery Rhymes of London Town: Miscellany of Poems, pictures and anecdotes'.

Rosie Francis, Programme Organiser, has put together a comprehensive set of lectures for the New Year including a feature on the life of David Niven, music from the Caribbean, Byzantine and Romanesque influenced architecture and a celebration of the centenary of Art Deco at the 1925 Paris Expo. Whilst continuing their work at Guildford Cathedral, Angela Stevens and the Heritage Volunteering group have also turned their skilled attention to more literary matters. Cleaning and documenting the vast number of books in the library at West Horsley Place continues where Angela is looking for interested volunteers.



Back in August 6 intrepid members of the Bookham Rifle club shot for the Astor Cup trophy. (Clive Gordon, Dave Crispin, John Belringer, Adam Fowler, Lina Jones and Tim Hammond).

This prestigious award is hard won since it begins with the clubs in each County having their own competition to see who will progress to shoot on its behalf. Here in Surrey, Bookham had to beat Wimbledon Park and Croydon to get there - a huge achievement already.

Bookham won the Astor Trophy beating all other counties, and ahead of Sussex by just 10 points. Every shot counted!

In other matches that day, Surrey won the County Sextette, shooting 20 shots at 50m and 100yds again where we beat the National record score for the competition by 15 points. The same County team then went on to shooting 60 shots at 50m (the wind had not let up!) to win again and also taking the Ladies 50m trophy for teams of three. Our team was made up of three ladies and three men with Bookham RC supplying three team members including the County Captain. It was a pretty amazing day for Bookham RC and for Surrey!!

Plastic Free Community status for Bookham continues and is now

over 85% complete.

Local business Hit The Trail recently became a Bronze level Plastic Free Business Champion, having eliminated three different items of singleuse plastic. We need just four more local businesses to gain accreditation to reach our target number. Farnham has recently become Surrey's first Plastic Free Community, having been working towards the accreditation since 2021.

Alongside the project we aim to raise awareness on reducing waste and recycling. As we've previously mentioned, Bookhams Residents Association has helped us develop a search tool where you can find local recycling points for a wide variety of items (see the Reduce Reuse Recycle section on www.bookhamresidents.org.uk).

We'll be reviewing and updating the content as a result of recent changes, including, sadly, the closure of the long-running Tadworth Terracycle collection scheme. However there is also a scheme supporting West Ashtead School with a collection point in Leatherhead. There may be a collection point in Fetcham too by the time you read this.

We've also previously mentioned the Refill app (www.refill.org.uk). This originally just listed places where you can refill reusable water bottles, but has since expanded to also show cafes and food stores that accept reusable coffee cups and/or containers.

We've noticed that the list of Bookham businesses is out of date so we'll be looking into getting that updated. If you run a business that's started up in Bookham in recent years and are interested in registering as a Refill location, please do let us know.

We're also interested to know if any local businesses offer a discount for customers who bring a reusable cup. 
