
### When and where?





# **South Bookham SPACE**

The beautiful South Bookham SPACE is situated next to the Chrystie Recreation Playground. It is a multifunctional, multipurpose building with on-site parking and three separate and distinct areas for hire.

The main area is available for event hires such as birthday parties at weekends. However, it also offers an extensive range of indoor activities for all ages; from TinyTalk and baby massage, to children's dance, a wide variety of Pilates classes for all levels of ability, Pole Fitness and Yoga. When hiring you will have access to a well-equipped kitchen and toilet facilities, and we can also provide chairs and tables for up to 60 people. We now have limited download WiFi throughout the building.

The Outer SPACE is a floodlit multi-use games area which hosts fitness sessions, tennis, 5aside soccer, netball and basketball. There is access to male & amp; female changing rooms with showers and we can provide goals, nets and hoops. The new Social SPACE extension is large enough to accommodate meetings, classes and social events for up to 12 people (depending on format), with kitchen facilities and a balcony overlooking the Outer SPACE. The Social SPACE facilities include a stairlift to the first floor and a hearing loop to encourage full accessibility. It is equipped with a projector and interactive whiteboard as aids to teaching and coaching.

2023 was a very successful year for the regular Friday Market. It is for many, the place to be on Friday morning. We asked customers to complete a short survey about their experiences at the Market. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive. The atmosphere, friendliness and range of products available all got top of the board scores.

We are open from 10am to 12 noon in the Old Barn Hall every week. The Market was open on 51 Fridays in 2022 and a total of 662 customers visited, of which 345 were new customers. They came to buy the high-quality products that are available, all locally produced with consequent low food miles.

We have a core group of customers who regularly visit the Market, and we are very grateful to them. From these the frequent flier was again Dennis Hicks, who came to 47 of the 51 Markets. In recognition we gave him a small reward for this loyalty.

There were eight others who attended 40 times or more during the year, who similarly received a small thank you.

On Saturday 26th November we held an extremely successful extra Market, focusing on Craft and Christmas food. It was open from 10.00 to 13.30 and was a buzz of activity throughout as customers took advantage to buy early presents from the huge range of unique products on offer.

That is not all. Most of our other usually available product range was also there – home cooked cakes, award winning specialty cheeses straight from the dairy, award winning artisan breads, home-made preserves and local honey. All these are available every Friday and more – free range eggs, plants & garden produce, home-made ready meals, books and jigsaws.



The club runs informal sessions where you can get help with any problem you are having or



With spring fast approaching, think back to the weeks before Christmas when there appeared to be cardboard arriving from all directions. Do you take it to the tip or bundle it up to go out with recycling? Alternatively, have you ever considered "no dig" gardening at home or on an allotment?

You can grow your own fruit, vegetables, and flowers at Eastwick Allotments in Bookham. The results are fresh seasonal home-grown produce with no "food miles". Get the children or grandchildren involved. Everything tastes better if you have grown it yourself. But what about all the digging? This is where all the cardboard comes in. No dig gardening is as simple as it sounds. All you need is:

Cardboard:

Compost: Readily available at the BAFGA hut on a Sunday morning at Eastwick allotments

Simple tools: A fork or spade, again, available at the allotment hut at very competitive prices.

There is a lot of advice on the internet or books about the No dig approach. But simply: Remove the weeds and grass from the chosen site. Cover the ground with a thick layer of cardboard.

Add a layer of compost onto the cardboard and you are ready to go.

Whether you prefer traditional gardening or want to try the "no dig method" at home or on an allotment, you can still become one of our members for a £5 annual subscription. You don't have to have an allotment to benefit from the competitive prices and discounts on your gardening essentials. Our shop on the allotments is open 10am till midday every Sunday. The gardening advice and friendly banter is of course free.



# **Friends of Bookham Commons**

### A centenary year

2023 was the one-hundred-year anniversary of Bookham Commons being bought in 1923 by a group of Bookham residents and donated to the community for access for all. It was also the year that Ian Swinney our long-standing ranger retired after fifty years' service with the National Trust, forty-seven of them working on Bookham Commons. Ian's replacement is Sam Valente who is now in place as the new Surrey Hills ranger. The National Trust held a retirement celebration and presented him with his own NT plaque. This year the belted Galloway cattle have only been grazing on Banks Common due to a movement restriction on the animals that were due to graze on the plains area. Visitors will have noticed that the vegetation has grown enormously this year, due to the early rain with some hazel putting on two metres of growth, and the silver birch not far behind. Clearance of non-native invaders like turkey oak has continued, along with ash trees affected by die-back. The programme of clearance to keep the plains area open will continue in 2024 as this is the most wildlife rich part of the commons.



### **Peter Pan Playschool**



The children loved the build up to Christmas at playschool. We turned the home corner into a Christmas house, which was lots of fun to decorate each day. We made Christmas cards and went in small groups to the postbox to post these and waited excitedly for them to be delivered to our homes.

We're very fortunate to be supported by the wonderful team at Eastwick Road Church where we had our nativity play and songs, and Lesley from the church played the piano for us. We raised £250 from the nativity play raffle and refreshments which really help top up our budget as a charity run preschool for local families. Our wreath making event raised around £200 too.

With the expansion of funded childcare for working families from April in the news, a lot of parents may be confused about if and when their child will be funded. At the moment all children are eligible for 15 hours funded childcare the term after they turn 3, and some eligible 2-year-olds can access FEET funding the term after they turn 2. Working parents of 3-year-olds who meet criteria can apply for an additional 15 hours in the extended offer.

From April this year eligible 2-year-olds will be funded the term after their 2nd birthday. In September this offer extends to eligible working families from the term after their child turns 9 months. You may have seen on the news that there is a real disparity between the funding that settings receive from government and how much it costs to deliver places. As a charity, we rely on fundraising to cover this gap and hope as the expansion of childcare is rolled out we can continue to offer free funded early education for all. If anyone local is able to support our fundraising in any way, we'd love to hear from you!

We are now full until September 2025 but we do have a couple of spaces for children that will be moving onto school in July 2024. Please get in touch as early as possible to secure your place in our unique and special playschool environment.

# **Dorking & District RSPB Group**

### **Great Spotted Woodpeckers**

Early spring is a great time to look for birds – they are starting to sing making them easier to locate and before the trees come into leaf they are easier to see than in high summer. Although perhaps not what a human would call song, the distinctive drumming of a male woodpecker against a tree in short sharp bursts in spring defends territory and aims to attract a mate. Great spotted woodpeckers are black-and-white birds with red underneath. Adult males have a red patch on the hind crown (right photo), the female's crown is plain black (left photo) while the youngsters' heads are mostly red.

The powerful bill is fitted on a skull reinforced to absorb the shock of striking wood and complemented by strong neck muscles. This enables the drumming, the excavation of the nest hole in a tree trunk, the cracking open of tough seeds and also, aided by a long bristly tongue, allows it to chip away wood to feed on hidden invertebrates. In the garden, a peanut feeder is an especial favourite. In late summer the adults can be seen teaching the young how to cope with this alien bounty. The brood of between four and six young leave the nest about three weeks after hatching, at which point each parent takes complete responsibility for half the youngsters.

The woodpecker has short legs with strong claws on the toes, of which two point forwards and two backwards (zygodactyl) which facilitate moving up the tree trunk by two-footed hops. Their stiffened tails act as a pivot and extra support. These also work well on garden bird feeders, where the woodpecker is often the most dominant species. *Images below are courtesy of Rob Carr, RSPB Dorking & District local group.*
